What is Nose Work?







Nose Work...

is a dog sport that mimics professional detection dog work in a way that provides a safe, positive environment that allows dogs to use their natural talents. Companion nose work dogs are taught to search independently, and handlers learn to read the dogs' communications.

Nose work is a sport that anyone can pursue. Many of the dogs active in nose work are assistance or therapy dogs, reactive dogs, or otherwise active dogs who need a job. Handlers who participate range from people interested volunteer or semi-professional scent detection work, to people who just want to provide their dog with an outlet for extra energy.

Introduction to Nose Work (Four 1-hour classes)

This introductory session will introduce your dog to the sport of canine scent work and introduces you, the handler, to the ways that your dog communicates scent movement and the location of the scent source. Each week will allow your dog to experience new scent scenarios and build problem-solving skills. Along the way, you'll learn how to read your dog's body language, and how your body language communicates meaning to your dog.



Classes use NACSW® methods, which were developed by professional detection dog handlers and are suited for companion, sport, and working dogs alike. Dogs will search for high value treats or toys during this introductory session. Each class is limited to four dog-handler teams. One dog will search at a time, allowing for individual attention. Dogs not actively searching must stay in facility-provided crates or owners' crates or cars when not working.



Whether you want to explore a new activity with your dog or want to compete in scent detection competitions in any venue, this class will build a strong foundation for your dog, emphasizing drive and independence.

She has trained six of her own dogs in canine scent detection, using NACSW® methods. She has coached many competitive teams, and many others who just want to enjoy scent detection work at home with their dog.
